Captain Carolyn "Carrie" Hoza 660th Transportation Company LSA Anaconda, Balad, Iraq

CPT Carolyn Hoza is the daughter of Phil Hoza III and Martha Hoza, both of Winnetka. She is the stepdaughter of Lucy Hoza and Joe Gutekanst, and the granddaughter to Norma Bratschi Hoza and the late Phil Hoza, Jr.

Carrie Hoza grew up in Winnetka and attended Greeley, Washburne, and New Trier High School, Class of 1992. She went on to graduate from Carroll College in Waukesha, WI with a cross-enrollment in the ROTC military officer training at Marquette University in Milwaukee, WI.

Upon her college graduation in December, 1997, Carrie was commissioned as a 2nd Lieutenant in the United States Army Transportation Corps. Following her initial officer schooling at Fort Eustis, VA, she was assigned to serve with the 2nd Infantry Division at Camp Nimble and Camp Casey in the Republic of South Korea, just south of the DMZ. As the transportation truck platoon leader she supported the troops on the Korean DMZ and throughout the northern part of the peninsula with supplies and transportation. Deemed a Korean Veteran, Carrie joined the New Trier Post 4821 Veterans of Foreign Wars in 2000.

Upon returning the States, 2LT Hoza was promoted to 1LT and spent eighteen months developing and installing an advanced individual training Army Transportation school for lower enlisted at Fort Bliss in El Paso, TX. At the end of her 3-year Active Duty obligation, Carrie was honorably discharged from the United States Army and given an opportunity to experience the civilian world.

Leaving the military with a great deal of leadership experience allowed Carrie to immediately find a career with the Harley-Davidson Motorcycle Company in Milwaukee, WI. She worked as a Work Group Advisor supervising groups that machined different engine parts for the larger motorcycles. While working full-time, she began her master's program with Cardinal Stritch University in Fox Point, WI. With only six weeks left until the completion of her degree and with three years separation from the Army, Carrie was unknowingly relocated into the 336th Transportation Group Reserve Unit at Fort Sheridan in an "Inactive Status".

With her uniforms in storage, Carrie was living in the Milwaukee area and not participating in any type of reserve training; however, on December 4th, 2003, she received an unexpected request in the form of a FedEx letter to appear for evaluation and Soldier Readiness Processing at Fort Snelling, MN. Four days later she had orders to Active Duty and orders to report no later than December 15th to Camp Atterbury, IN with an activated reserve unit, the 660th Transportation Company from Cadiz/Zainesville, OH. The reserve unit comprised primarily of Ohio men and women and was preparing for deployment to Iraq in early 2004.

The 660th Transportation Company deployed overseas on February 7th, 2004 and spent a month in Kuwait awaiting their vehicles before heading to Iraq where they served eleven months as part of Operation Iraqi Freedom II. Crossing the border in unarmored, open door humvees and trucks, Carrie's unit reported to Logistical Support Area (LSA) Anaconda on March 7th, 2004.

LSA Anaconda is a large military base serving the area located near Balad, 40 miles north of Baghdad. Their unit upgraded their vehicles with "hillbilly armor" consisting of steel armor plates, rock quarry conveyer belting, and sandbags; finally, they received newer "up-armored equipment" towards the end of their tour.

During her tour of duty, Carrie was promoted to Captain and served as the 3rd Platoon Leader, functioning as a Convoy Commander delivering and escorting three to five mile long fuel truck convoys with gun trucks and up-armored humvees. The "3rd Herd" Platoon traveled daily throughout the Sunni Triangle north, west, and south of Baghdad in support of our Army and Marine soldiers.

As part of OIF II, the 660th transported 23 million gallons of JP8 jet fuel and traveled over 935,000 miles outside of the "wire", experiencing 130-150° F temperatures, long hours, harrowing ambushes, explosive roadside bombs (IED: Improvised Explosive Device), and hidden landmines. Unfortunately, the 660th lost four soldiers and three Kellogg, Brown, and Root (KBR: contracted American drivers) contract drivers while performing these missions. The 3rd Platoon was considered one of the finest platoons by KBR and military convoy operators.

During the long days and nights on the road, rare friendships were bonded, friendships that will last a lifetime. It was a year that none would want to repeat and will never forget, but are proud to have experienced as a unit serving their country. The entire unit returned as a group to the United States on February 7th, 2005, always remembering members of the 660th who were killed in action: SGT James, Harlan, SSG Donald Davis, SSG Richard Morgan, and SPC Allen Nolan.

Carrie received the Bronze Star Medal for leadership and service and has continued to show leadership in her speeches to schools, nursing homes, churches, and civic groups on the North Shore, as well as volunteering with the New Trier VFW Post 4831 and Senator Kirk's Veterans Affair Committee.

CPT Hoza is presently living in Winnetka and working for Bratschi Plumbing as the 4th generation of Walter Bratschi. She formerly resigned her commission in October 2006, having completed her eight year obligation and honorable discharge.

The Loss of HMCS Skeena; Chapter 7, HMCS Skeena Earns Her Battle Honours.

HMCS Skeena is often remembered on how she was lost in the latter part of October 1944. Very seldom is she remembered for her battle honours: The Battle of the Atlantic, Normandy and the Bay of Biscay.

Shortly after the fall of France, Germany took advantage of the French ports due to their advantageous positions on the Atlantic Coast. Using these ports in the western areas of France meant that Germany did not have to launch their naval fleet through the heavy guarded English Channel.

The German Naval Fleet at that time consisted of many different types of vessels but it was the infamous U Boats that Germany needed to protect and to provide easy access to the North Atlantic.

The North Atlantic naval conveys provided the much-needed supply route feeding Britain with food, fuel and wartime supplies in its battle with Germany, hence Germany needed easy access to disrupt and threaten this route if they were to win the war against Britain.

Commencing just after the fall of France, Germany began the construction of the U-boat bunker at Brest France in early 1941 and by the summer of that year, the 1st and 9th U-boat flotillas moved from Germany to Brest. The bunker was built in two phases, the first comprising of 13 U-boat pens, and the second 9 pens. The bunker measured 1090 x 630 feet and the roof was almost 12 feet thick. Subsequently the thickness of the roof was increased to 20 feet. The bunker at Brest the largest U-boat bunker built by the Germans during the war. During the war, Brest was attacked over 80 times by Allied bombers, but it would take until August 1944 before they succeeded in penetrating the roof of the pens when the bunker received 9 direct hits.

It was not always the air force taking part in the Battle of Brest, but also members of the Royal Canadian Navy taking part in hunting down any type of shipping leaving these coastal ports.

It was the of 5-6 July 1954 MCS Skeena participated in operation "Dredger" against German escort vessels at the Uboat meeting points off Brest and southward. During the night, the 12th Escort Group, comprising of HMC Ships Qu'Appelle, Saskatchewan, Skeena and Restigouche, attacked 3 patrol boats off Brest: One enemy surface ship was sunk but not before hitting Qu'Appelle and Saskatchewan many times with small calibre gunfire.

HMCS Skeena under the command of LCdr Patrick F.X. Russel also suffered damage during the night. Exchanging shell fire back and forth, Skeena took many casualties.

One such story of this battle is told by Cdr Lewis (medical officer aboard HMCS Skeena) who was seeing to the many injured seaman who were being brought down below to the mess decks. During the amputation of a man's arm, a direct hit on the hull at the mess deck level was taken by Skeena. The shell penetrated the hull and instead of exploding and killing most of the crew outright, the unexploded shell rattled its way around the room and rested at the surgeon's feet. In fine Royal Canadian Navy expressions by this officer, the medical officer while working away said, "I will keep that as a souvenir". The other men in the room were in shock not only because of the unexploded shell, but hoping the doctor was talking about the shell and not the poor man's arm. Although dark humour in nature is was his way of dealing with the hardships of battle, finding some way to continue on during this disturbing event.

October 2019 marks the 75th anniversary of the loss of HMCS Skeena. The local sea cadet corps is named after this ship, and it is the wish of the cadets of RCSCC Skeena to attend services in Iceland this year to commemorate the loss of their ship.
